### 1. <u>India gets its 37th World Unesco</u> World Heritage Site

- India's nomination of the "Victorian and Art Deco Ensembles of Mumbai" has been inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage list.
- The decision was taken at the 42nd session of the World Heritage Committee of UNESCO at Manama in Bahrain.
- As recommended by the World Heritage Committee, India accepted the renaming of the ensemble as "Victorian Gothic and Art Deco Ensembles of Mumbai".
- This makes Mumbai city the second city in India after Ahmedabad to be inscribed on the World Heritage List.
- India now has overall 37 World Heritage Inscriptions with 29 Cultural, 07 Natural and 01 Mixed sites.
- India stands second largest in number after China in terms of the number of World Heritage properties in ASPAC (Asia and Pacific) region, it is overall sixth in the world.
- The Ensemble consists of 94 buildings primarily of 19th-century Victorian Gothic revival and early 20th century Art Deco style of architecture with the Oval Maidan in the centre.
- The inscription has been done under Criteria (ii) and (iv) as defined in the UNESCO's Operational Guidelines.
- Criterion (ii) refers to the important interchange of human values, over a span of time on development of architecture, monumental arts, town planning and landscape.
- Criterion (iv) refers to being an outstanding example of a type of building, architectural or technological ensemble or landscape which illustrates a significant stage (s) in human history.
- Currently, 42 sites from the country figures in the Tentative List of World Heritage.

 The Ministry of Culture recommends one property every year for nomination to UNESCO.

### Related Information Criteria for Selection of World Heritage Sites-

- These criteria are explained in the World Heritage Convention, 1972.
- These criteria are regularly revised by the World Heritage Committee to reflect the evolution of the World Heritage concept itself.

### **Tentative lists of Heritage Sites-**

- All countries are required to submit their Tentative Lists of places which they consider to be a cultural or natural heritage of outstanding universal value and therefore suitable for inscription on the World Heritage List.
- If any site is listed in World Heritage Sites, then it must be removed from the tentative list.

### World Heritage Sites in India-

- There are 37 (27 cultural, 7 natural and 1 mixed) World Heritage Sites in India after the inclusion of "Victorian and Art Deco Ensembles of Mumbai" in July 2018.
- In 2016, following three sites have been listed in World Heritage Sites-(i) Nalanda Mahavihara University, Bihar
  - (ii) Capitol Building Complex-Chandigarh
  - (iii) Khangchendzonga National Park, Sikkim
- In July 2017, Ahmedabad became India's first city to be listed in World Heritage Sites.
- In July 2018, Victorian and Art Deco Ensembles of Mumbai listed as 37<sup>th</sup> World Heritage Sites from India.
- Only one mixed-criteria site in India is Khangchendzonga National Park, Sikkim.

### 2. Asia's first patent arbitration centre to open in Tokyo

- Asia's first arbitration centre specialised in intellectual property is slated to open in Tokyo to resolve the growing number of disputes in the region.
- The International Arbitration Centre in Tokyo (IACT) is set to have around a dozen arbitrators from around the world, who would try to resolve disputes within a period of one year.
- The IACT is due to handling disputes between non-Japanese companies also if both parties agree.

### 3. Maharashtra govt announced 'Kanya Van Samruddhi Yojana'

- The Maharashtra government announced a new scheme called 'Kanva Van Samruddhi Yoiana', wherein farmers families where girl children are born will be given saplings for plantation.
- The scheme is aimed at empowering women and promoting tree plantation.
- A farmer family blessed with a girl child between April 1 and March 31 can make an application with the gram panchayat after which they will get 10 saplings free of cost from the forest department.
- It is expected that the income from these trees will be utilised for safeguarding the future of the girls.
- The saplings will be of different varieties, including teakwood, mango, jackfruit, black plum and tamarind.
- The scheme will be applicable for the maximum of two girls.

### 4. Black Beauty' meteorite reveals when life may have existed on <u>Mars</u>

Researchers from Natural History Museum of Denmark found new evidence for this rapid crystallisation and crust formation on Mars.

- The study, based on the analysis of Mars meteorite **Black** rare Beauty, significantly expands the window for when life might have existed on Mars.
- Crust formation is an important step in the development of terrestrial planets, and what makes Black Beauty special and expensive is that it contains small pieces of the crust from
- More precisely, Black Beauty contains the rare mineral zircon, in which researchers have found a high concentration of hafnium.
- Zircon is a very robust mineral that is ideally suited to provide absolute ages.
- Zircon also acts as a small time capsule as it preserves information about the environment where and when it was created.

#### 6. **Directorate** of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) r<u>ecovered</u> smuggled Exotic Birds

- Illegal import of wildlife which is in violation of the Wild Life Protection Act automatically becomes a violation of the Customs Act by virtue of Section 111(d) of the Customs Act.
- All the birds have consequently been seized under the provisions of the Customs Act, 1962 read with the Wild Life Protection Act, 1972.
- DRI is committed to combating Wild Life Crime including cross-border crime such as trafficking in wildlife art-crafts.

- The Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) is an Indian intelligence agency.
- It is India's chief anti-smuggling intelligence, investigations and operations agency.
- The Directorate is run by officers from the Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC).

### 7. <u>Suresh Prabhu launched Mobile</u> App 'ReUnite'

- Union Minister Suresh Prabhu launched a mobile application called **ReUnite** which helps to trackandtrace missing and abandoned children in India.

- The app is multiuser where parents and citizens can upload pictures of children, and provide detailed description like name, birthmark, address, report to the police station, search and identify missing kids.

### 1. Sashakt: the 5-pronged strategy for NPAs

- Finance minister Piyush Goyal said that government has accepted a report submitted by a committee of bankers led by Punjab National Bank chairman Sunil Mehta.
- The committee has recommended a five-pronged strategy -- Project 'Sashakt'.

- 'SASHAKT' stands for strengthening and the whole objective was to strengthen the credit capacity, credit culture and portfolio of public sector banks.
- The panel has recommended the creation of an AMC (Asset Management Company) under the framework of an alternative investment fund (AIF) to deal with NPA cases of more than 500 crore rupees,
- The resolution process which will be entirely led by banks.

# 2. Four species added to recovery programme by Wildlife Board

- The National Board for Wildlife (NBWL) recently added four species-
  - (a) The Northern River Terrapin,
  - (b) Clouded Leopard,
  - (c) Arabian Sea Humpback Whale,
  - (d) Red Panda
  - to a Recovery Programme for Critically Endangered Species on the recommendation of a Standing Committee.
- The programme is one of the three components of the centrally funded scheme, Integrated Development of Wildlife Habitats (IDWH).
- So far, 17 species have been identified under the recovery programme.
- These are the Snow Leopard, Bustard (including Floricans), Dolphin, Hangul, Nilgiri Tahr, Marine Turtles, Dugongs, Edible Nest Swiftlet, Asian Wild Buffalo, Nicobar Megapode, Manipur Brow-antlered Deer, Vultures, Malabar Civet, Indian Rhinoceros, Asiatic Lion, Swamp Deer and Jerdon's Courser.

# Related Information Integrated Development of Wildlife Habitats (IDWH)

 It is started in 2008-09 for providing support to protected areas, protection of wildlife outside protected areas and recovery programmes for saving critically endangered species and habitats.



### National Board for Wildlife (NBWL)

- National Board for Wild Life is a "Statutory Organization" constituted under the Wildlife Protection Act, 1972.
- The board is "advisory" in nature and advises the Central Government on framing policies and measures for conservation of wildlife in the country.
- It serves as an apex body to review all wildlife-related matters and approve projects in and around national parks and sanctuaries.
- The National Board for Wildlife has 47 members with the Prime Minister in the Chair.
- The Minister in charge of the Ministry of Environment & Forests in the Central Government is the Vice-Chairperson.

### 3. <u>Century's longest total lunar</u> <u>eclipse to be seen in Dubai on July</u> 27

- Dubai is all set to witness a total lunar eclipse on the night of July 27, an observatory in Dubai has announced.
- According to the Dubai Astronomy Group, the eclipse will last for about one hour and 43 minutes, the longest in the century, and will also feature a "blood moon".

# Related Information Eclipse

 An eclipse happens when a planet or a moon gets in the way of the sun's light. we can experience two kinds of eclipses: solar eclipses and lunar eclipses.

### Solar Eclipse-

- A solar eclipse (as seen from the planet Earth) is a type of eclipse that occurs when the Moon passes between the Sun and Earth, and when the Moon fully or partially blocks ("occults") the Sun.
- This can happen only at new moon when the Sun and the Moon are in conjunction as seen from Earth in an alignment referred to as syzygy.

 In a total eclipse, the disk of the Sun is fully obscured by the Moon. In partial and annular eclipses, only part of the Sun is obscured.

### **Lunar Eclipse**

- During a lunar eclipse, Earth gets in the way of the sun's light hitting the moon.
- That means that during the night, a full moon fades away as Earth's shadow covers it up.
- Blood Moon or Copper Moon- During a lunar eclipse the moon looks reddish because Earth's atmosphere absorbs the other colours while it bends some sunlight toward the moon. It is Known as Blood Moon or Copper Moon

#### What is a blue moon

 When a full moon occurs twice in a month, the second full moon is called a blue moon.

### **Super Moon**

 The coming lunar eclipse will be more spectacular because, during the eclipse, the Moon will be near its perigee and hence it will look larger than an average full Moon and is termed a Super Moon.

#### 1. Interpol and its different notices

 The Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) and the Enforcement Directorate (ED) have approached the Interpol to bring back fugitive economic offenders such as Nirav Modi, Mehul Choksi and Vijay Mallya, who are living abroad.

#### What is Interpol?

- Interpol is the shorter and betterknown name of the International Criminal Police Organization, a network comprising 192-member nations, including India.
- The agency, with its headquarters in Lyon, France, was established in 1923.
- The Interpol basically connects police across the world even if these individual member nations do not have diplomatic relations.

### **India and Interpol**

• India has been a member since 1956.

- India maintains a National Central Bureau which serves as the national platform for cooperation between domestic law enforcement units and the international police community.
- India has collaborated with the Interpol in tackling a myriad of organised crimes such as poaching, wildlife trafficking, spurious drugs and fake medicine rackets, among others.

### What does Interpol do?

- The Interpol facilitates information exchange, knowledge sharing and research between nations.
- This is done by issuing colour-coded 'notices' in four languages -
  - (a) English,
  - (b) Spanish,
  - (c) French and
  - (d) Arabic
- The Interpol doesn't have law enforcement powers such as arrest.
- When a member nation approaches it with a specific request backed with court orders, the Interpol sends it out to other countries. The information received is sent back to the country.

### What are different Interpol notices? Red Notice

- A Red Notice is a request to locate and provisionally arrest an individual pending extradition.
- It is issued by the General Secretariat at the request of a member country or an international tribunal based on a valid national arrest warrant.
- However, the arrest of the fugitive is based on the rule of the member nation where he or she is located.

#### **Yellow Notice**

- A Yellow Notice is issued to help locate missing persons, often minors, or to help identify persons who are unable to identify themselves.
- This is highly useful in cases of human trafficking or in case of missing persons due to calamities

#### **Blue Notice**

 A Blue Notice is issued to collect additional information about a person's identity, location or activities in relation to a crime. This does not guarantee extradition or arrest of the person.



### **Black Notice**

 A Black Notice is a request to seek information on unidentified bodies in member nations.

#### **Green Notice**

 A Green Notice is issued to provide warnings and intelligence about persons who have committed criminal offences and are likely to repeat these crimes in other countries.

### **Orange Notice**

 An Orange Notice is issued to provide warnings about warn of an event, a person, an object or a process representing a serious and imminent threat to public safety.

### **Purple Notice**

 A Purple Notice is a request to seek or provide information on the modus operandi, objects, devices and concealment methods used by criminals.

# INTERPOL-United Nations Security Council Special Notice

- It is issued for individuals and entities that are subject to sanctions imposed by the United Nations Security Council.
- Its principal function is to alert national law enforcement authorities that sanctions such as assets freeze, arms embargo, and travel ban apply to designated individuals and entities.

### 2. <u>Bengaluru to get India's first e-</u> waste plant

- The country's first e-waste recycling unit will come up in Bengaluru.
- The unit to be set up by the ministry of chemicals and fertilisers.

### **Related Information**

- The country's e-waste generation is on the rise and estimated to reach 52 lakh tonnes in 2020.
- A 2016 study by Assocham and KPMG ranked India among the top five countries in e-waste generation, with an estimated 1.85 million tonnes generated annually.

- According to the study, computers comprised 70% of the total e-waste and telecommunication equipment accounted for 12%.
- Bengaluru ranked third after Mumbai and Delhi and generated nearly 92,000 tonnes of e-waste annually.

# 3. An app "Nutrify India Now" to measure nutrition content of Indian food

- The Indian Council of Medical Research's Hyderabad-based National Institute of Nutrition has launched a mobile App "Nutrify India Now" that offers comprehensive nutrition related information on a wide range of Indian food articles.
- The app is based on authentic and well-researched India-specific databases and uses guidelines prescribed by ICMR, the apex medical research body of the country.
- It also provides information on several parameters such as protein, vitamin and mineral content of the food items, besides their calorific value.
- One can search in as many as 17 languages and six food groups are covered.

### 4. <u>Indian scientists discovered</u>

 Indian scientists at Physical Research Laboratory, Ahmedabad, found a sub-Saturn or super-Neptune size planet about 600 light years away from the Earth.

exoplanet 600 light years away

- The discovery was made by measuring the mass of the planet using the indigenously designed "PRL Advance Radial-velocity Abu-sky Search" (PARAS) spectrograph.
- The discovery is important for understanding the formation mechanism of sub-Saturn and super-Neptune like planets that are too close to host star.

PARAS (PRL Advance Radial-velocity Abu-sky Search)



- The spectrograph is the first of its kind in the country which can measure the mass of a planet going around a star.
- They measured the mass of the planet using the indigenously designed PARAS spectrograph integrated with the 1.2-metre telescope located at PRL's Gurushikhar Observatory in Mount Abu, Rajasthan.

# 1. Cabinet approved accession to WIPO Copyright Treaty (WCT), 1996 and WIPO Performance and

### Phonograms Treaty (WPPT), 1996

 These treaties will extend coverage of copyright to the internet and the digital environment.

- The approval is a step towards the laid the objective in National Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) Policy adopted by the Government on 12<sup>th</sup> Mav National Intellectual **Property** Rights (IPR) Policy- aims to get **IPRs** value for through commercialization by providing guidance and support to EPR owners about commercial opportunities of ecommerce through the Internet and mobile platforms.
- Both the treaties provide the framework for creators and rights owners to use technical tools to protect their works and safeguard information about their use i.e. Protection of Technological Protection Measures (TPMs) and Rights Management Information (RMI).

# Related Information Copyright Act, 1957

- The Copyright Act, 1957 was amended in 2012 to bring it in conformity, with WCT and WPPT.
- These include the amendment in the definition of "Communication to the public" to make it applicable to the digital environment (Section 2(ff)) as also introduced provisions related to Technological.
- Other Important sections of the acts are-
  - (a) Protection Measures (Section 65A) &
  - (b) Rights Management Information (Section 65B)
  - (c) Moral rights of performers (Section 38B);
  - (d) Exclusive rights of the performers (Section 38A);
  - (e) Safe harbour provisions over electronic medium (Section 52 (1) (b) and (c))

### WIPO Copyright Treaty (WCT)

- The treaty came in force on March 6, 2002, and has been adopted by 96 contracting parties till date.
- It is a special agreement under Berne Convention (for protection of literary and artistic works).



- It has provisions to extend the protection of copyrights contained therein to the digital environment.
- Further, it recognises the rights specific to the digital environment, of making work available, to address "on-demand" and other interactive modes of access.

## WIPO Performances and Phonograms Treaty (WPPT)

- It came in force on May 20, 2002, and has 96 contracting parties as its members.
- WPPT deals with rights of two kinds of beneficiaries, particularly in the digital environment
  - (i) Performers (actors, singers, musicians etc.)(ii) Producers of Phonograms (Sound
  - recordings).
- The treaty empowers right owners in their negotiations with new digital platforms and distributors.
- It recognizes the moral rights of the performers for the first time & provides exclusive economic rights to them.

# 2. Koala bear genome decoded for the first time

- More than 50 researchers in seven countries uncovered 26,558 koala genes, yielding vital DNA clues for vaccines against diseases such as sexually transmitted chlamydia.
- The genome has allowed us to understand the koala immune genes in detail for the first time.

### Related Information Koala

- The koala is an arboreal herbivorous marsupial native to Australia.
- The koala is found in coastal areas of the mainland's eastern and southern regions, inhabiting Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, and South Australia.
- The International Union for Conservation of Nature qualifies the koala's protection status as "vulnerable".

### 3. ISRO's first 'pad abort' test successful

- The first 'pad abort' test critical for a future human space mission was conducted successfully.
- The test was conducted at the Satish Dhawan Space Centre, Sriharikota.
- The Pad Abort Test (PAT) demonstrated the safe recovery of the crew module in case of any exigency at the launch pad.
- The PAT (pad abort test) is the first in a series of tests to qualify a crew escape system technology of a manned mission in the future.
- The Crew Escape System is an emergency escape measure to quickly pull the crew module — the astronaut cabin — along with astronauts out to a safe distance from the launch vehicle in the event of a launch abort.
- The rockets are solid-fuel powered and specially designed for quickly ejecting the crew module and astronauts to a safe distance without exceeding the safe G-levels.

# 4. 'Khan Prahari' App and Coal Mine Surveillance & Management System (CMSMS)

- The Union Minister Shri Piyush Goyal has launched the CMSMS and Mobile Application 'Khan Prahari'.
- The basic objective of CMSMS is reporting, monitoring and taking suitable action on unauthorised coal mining activities.
- The CMSMS is a web-based GIS application through which location of sites for unauthorised mining can be detected.
- The leasehold boundary of all the coal mines is displayed on this map.
- The system will use satellite data to detect changes by which unauthorised mining activity extending beyond the allotted lease area can be detected and suitable action can be taken on it.
- The system also uses information provided by responsible citizens using smartphones using the mobile application "Khan Prahari'.



- Khan Prahari is a tool for reporting any activity taking place related to illegal coal mining like rat-hole mining, pilferage etc.
- Hence, both satellite data and human information will be used to capture information on the unauthorised mining activities.

# 1. <u>Uttarakhand HC order declared</u> <u>animals as legal entities</u>

- The Uttarakhand High Court has declared that "all members of the animal kingdom including birds and aquatic life have similar rights as humans".
- It has also ordained that animals throughout Uttarakhand should be treated as "legal entities having a distinct persona with corresponding rights, duties and liabilities of a living person."
- The court directed the government to constitute societies for the prevention of cruelty to animals in each district and to appoint infirmaries for the treatment and care of animals.
- It also directed the government to "enforce the provisions of the Prevention and Control of Infectious and Contagious Diseases in Animals Act, 2009.

#### **Related Information**

 The Uttarakhand HC had in March last year in a similar order declared the rivers Ganga and Yamuna as legal entities but the order was stayed by the Supreme Court three months later.

# 2. Cabinet approved DNA Technology (Use and Application) Regulation Bill, 2018

- The primary intended purpose for enactment of "The DNA Technology (Use and Application) Regulation Bill" is for expanding the application of DNA-based forensic technologies to support and strengthen the justice delivery system of the country.
- The utility of DNA based technologies for solving crimes, and to identify missing persons, is well recognized across the world.

Background Law Commission report



- In 2017, the Law Commission of India, in its 271st report, prepared the draft Bill named The DNA Based Technology (Use and Regulation) Bill, 2017 after examining various judicial pronouncements and constitutional provisions.
- The exercise was initiated by the Commission after the Department of Biotechnology forwarded its draft of 'The Use and Regulation of DNA based Technology in Civil and Criminal Proceedings, Identification of Missing Persons and Human Remains Bill, 2016'.

# Related Information DNA Profiling (DNA fingerprinting, DNA testing, or DNA typing)

- DNA profiling is the process where a specific DNA pattern, called a profile, is obtained from a person or sample of bodily tissue.
- Even though we are all unique, most of our DNA is actually identical to other people's DNA.
- However, specific regions vary highly between people. These regions are called polymorphic.
- Differences in these variable regions between people are known as polymorphisms.
- Each of us inherits a unique combination of polymorphisms from our parents.
- DNA polymorphisms can be analysed to give a DNA profile.

# Short tandem repeats method for DNA Profiling

- One of the current techniques for DNA profiling uses polymorphisms called short tandem repeats.
- Short tandem repeats (or STRs) are regions of non-coding DNA that contain repeats of the same nucleotide sequence.
- For example, GATAGATAGATAGATAGATA is an STR where the nucleotide sequence GATA is repeated six times.
- STRs are found at different places or genetic loci in a person's DNA.

 To produce a DNA profile, scientists examine STRs at ten, or more, genetic loci. These genetic loci are usually on different chromosomes.

### **Application of DNA Profiling**

- Identify the probable origin of a body fluid sample associated with a crime or crime scene
- Reveal family relationships
- Identify disaster victims

- Thousands of Brus fled Mizoram and migrated to Tripura after Bru militants gunned down a forest guard inside the Dampa Tiger Reserve on October 21, 1997.

# 1. <u>Indigenous "CUSAT Stratosphere-Troposphere Radar" to track monsoon winds now functional</u>

- The new radar named CUSAT Stratosphere-Troposphere Radar (CUSAT ST-205 Radar)- throws 205 MHz radio waves to detect the atmospheric perturbations.
- The radar designed and fabricated in India adds to the already available radars and Sonars to keep a close watch on the way winds move in the upper atmosphere.
- Weather radars detect perturbations in wind and water content of the atmosphere using the same principle.
- The radar scans the sky horizontally and vertically in small steps of 1 degree thus getting a threedimensional picture of the atmosphere.
- While scanning it throws a pulse of radio waves of 200 to 205 MHz frequency at the atmosphere and waits for it to bounce back.
- The radar situated in Cochin University of Science and Technology in Cochin- a strategic place where the monsoon makes the first entry into the subcontinent, the new radar will add to further the precision of weather, especially the monsoon, in India.

# 2. <u>Uttar Pradesh grants 3 forest</u> villages revenue status under FRA

- Three villages inhabited by the Tongia Scheduled Tribe in and around forests in Saharanpur district, Uttar Pradesh will be given the status of revenue village under the Forest Rights Act, 2006, (FRA).
- Kaluwala, Sodhinagar and Bhagwatpur were given the revenue status, which means that the village area will come under the revenue department instead of forest department.



 The FRA has a provision for turning forest villages into revenue villages so that civic facilities reach these areas.

### Related Information Forest Rights Act (FRA)

- The Scheduled Tribes and Other Traditional Forest Dwellers (Recognition of Forest Rights) Act, 2006, is a key piece of forest legislation passed in India on 18 December 2006.
- It has also been called the Forest Rights Act, the Tribal Rights Act, the Tribal Bill, and the Tribal Land Act.
- Eligible People 
   (a) Those who "primarily reside in forests" and who depend on forests and forest land for a livelihood.
   (b) Either the claimant must be a member of the Scheduled Tribes scheduled in that area or must have been residing in the forest for 75 years.

# Rights have given under the Forest Rights Act

### (a) Title rights

- Ownership to land that is being farmed by tribal or forest dwellers as on 13 December 2005, subject to a maximum of 4 hectares
- ownership is only for land that is actually being cultivated by the concerned family as on that date, meaning that no new lands are granted.

### (b) Use rights

 To minor forest produce (also including ownership), to grazing areas, to pastoralist routes, etc.

#### (c) Relief and development rights

• To rehabilitation in case of illegal eviction or forced displacement and to basic amenities, subject to restrictions for forest protection.

#### (d) Forest management rights

• To protect forests and wildlife

3. <u>UN member states approved USD</u> 6.69 billion for 13 peacekeeping operations in 2018-19

- The Fifth Committee (Administrative and Budgetary) of the General Assembly recommended authorisation of USD 6.69 billion to finance 13 peacekeeping missions from July 1, 2018, to June 30, 2019.
- include-The missions MINUJUSTH (a) (United Nations Mission for Justice Support in Haiti), MINURSO (Mission for the Referendum in Western Sahara), MINUSCA (Multidimensional (c) Integrated Stabilisation Mission in the Central African Republic), (d) MONUSCO (Stabilisation Mission in the Democratic Republic of the Congo) and UNIFIL (Interim Force in Lebanon).
- The Committee also approved significant management reforms including the creation of two new departments focused on political and peacebuilding affairs and four standalone divisions for Africa.
- Affirming "Middle East Division" as the name of the related new regional division, the lead responsibility for the United Nations Assistance Mission in Afghanistan (UNAMA) and United Nations Assistance Mission for Iraq (UNAMI) would be placed in the Department of Political and Peacebuilding Affairs.
- The United States is the biggest contributor to the United Nations. China is the other top contributor with 10.3 per cent and Japan with 9.7 per cent.

## 1. <u>Biodegradable plastic made from</u> tree glue

- Scientists have found that a natural 'tree glue' which stiffens plant cells can be turned into a strong, biodegradable plastic.
- The natural glue called **lignin** holds cellulose fibres together.
- Researchers from the University of Warwick in the UK genetically modified some bacteria called **Rhodococcus Jostii** to turn lignin into useful chemicals.
- There are only a small number of organisms that can break down lignin.
- Plastic is notoriously difficult to recycle - and only 12 Percent of household waste is reprocessed.
- The rest is either burnt or goes to landfill.

# 4. Cosmic collision with 'Sausage' galaxy reshaped Milky Way

- Astronomers have discovered an ancient cosmic collision with an object, dubbed the "Sausage" galaxy, that reshaped the structure of the Milky Way galaxy.
- It is observed using data from the European Space Agency's Gaia satellite.
- Scientists propose that around 8 billion to 10 billion years ago, an unknown dwarf galaxy smashed into our own Milky Way.

- Sausage debris was scattered all around the inner parts of the Milky Way, creating the 'bulge' at the galaxy's centre and the surrounding 'stellar halo.'
- The orbits are further elongated by the growing Milky Way disk, which swells and becomes thicker following the collision.
- The Milky Way continues to collide with other galaxies, such as the puny Sagittarius dwarf galaxy.
- However, the Sausage galaxy was much more massive. Its total mass in gas, stars and dark matter was more than 10 billion times the mass of our Sun

## 5. How Ethiopia and Kenya have put a world heritage site in danger

- Lake Turkana is the world's largest desert lake- located in Kenya's remote northern arid lands and is the most saline of Africa's great lakes.
- Its ecology supports a host of local and migratory bird and wildlife populations.
- It's also home to unique fossil and archaeological discoveries.
- In 1973, Sibiloi National Park was created on the north-eastern lakeshore to conserve these remarkable discoveries that have contributed so much to our understanding of human evolution.
- And in 1983 and 1985, the lake's South and Central Islands were designated national parks because of their outstanding wildlife breeding habitats, notably for the Nile crocodile.
- These three national parks were inscribed as a World Heritage Site in 1997 for their "geological and fossil records" and "diverse aquatic and terrestrial habitats".

### **Related Information**

- There are 1,092 UNESCO World Heritage sites in the world, five of which are within Kenya.
- Once inscribed, the sites are protected according to local legislation and international treaties.



- Under the convention guidelines, state parties are obliged to submit reports every six years on each of their World Heritage sites.
- If a site comes under threat, the World Heritage Committee can initiate the agreed process of "reactive monitoring" – an independent mission to review and produce a report on the state of conservation of the site.
- If the site is found to be facing danger, the mission can recommend it be placed on the "List of World Heritage in Danger".

### Why the lake was put on the danger list

- Threats were identified as the Gibe dams and irrigation plantation developments on Ethiopia's Omo River.
- More than 80% of the lake's freshwater inflow is provided by the Omo River and so these projects affect the lake's ecology.
- The committee requested that Ethiopia suspend construction works on the Gibe III dam and submit assessments on the dam and irrigation development plans.

#### Next steps

 The World Heritage Committee has now requested Kenya to invite a reactive monitoring mission to review what's happened and to propose a way forward to remove the Lake Turkana National Parks from the "List of World Heritage in Danger".

### 1. NASA Funding Project "RAMA" to Turn Asteroids into Spaceships

- NASA has announced it would give funds to a California-based 3D printing company for finding ways to turn asteroids into giant, autonomous spacecraft, which could fly to outposts in space.
- The project is named as RAMA (Reconstituting Asteroids into Mechanical Automata).
- The company plans to use 3D printing to turn the asteroids into self-flying vehicles by 2030.
- The company is considering sending an advanced robotic "Seed Craft" out to rendezvous with a succession of near-Earth asteroids in space, as part of its long-term project.
- The Seed Craft would harvest material from the space rocks, then use this feedstock to construct propulsion, navigation, energy-storage and other key systems onsite with the aid of 3D printing and other technologies.
- Thus, transformed into autonomous spacecraft, the asteroids could be programmed to fly to a mining station in Earth-moon space, or anywhere else they're needed.

2. Niti Aayog wants states to promote zero budget natural farming



 NITI Aayog made a case for promoting Zero Budget Natural Farming (ZBNF) in states, saying it would help in doubling farmers' income by 2022.

### **Zero Budget Natural Farming (ZBNF)**

- Under ZBNF, neither fertilizer nor pesticide is used and only 10 per cent of water is to be used for irrigation as compared to traditional farming technique.
- Farmers use only local seeds and produce their own seeds.
- The cost of biological pesticides and fertilizers is almost negligible compared to chemical fertilizers. So, this method of natural farming also called Zero Budget Farming.
- These biological pesticides and fertilizers include earthworms, cow dung, urine, plants, human excreta etc.
- The states can promote ZBNF under the two farm sector schemes-Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojana and Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana.

### Paramparagat Krishi Vikas Yojajna-

- Launched in 2016.
- Improve organic farming and soil health.
- Also known as Traditional Farming Improvement Programme.

#### Note-

 Sikkim has become India's first fully organic state by implementing organic practices on around 75,000 hectares of agricultural land.

### Rashtriya Krishi Vikas Yojana

- Launched in 2007 to achieve 4
   Percent annual growth in the

3. <u>India focusing more on the e-visa</u> scheme

### e-visa scheme

• The Government of India had launched the e-Visa scheme on November 27, 2014.

- The scheme has been extended to 163 Countries/Territories. 25 Indian airports and 5 Indian Ports have been designated for providing e-visa service.
- e-Visa has been sub-divided into 3 categories i.e.
  - (a) e-tourist visa,
  - (b) e-Business visa and
  - (c) e-Medical visa
- This facility is available to Foreigners whose sole objective of visiting India is recreation, sight-seeing, short duration medical treatment, casual business visit, etc. and not valid for any other purpose/activities.
- Applicants of the eligible countries/territories may apply online minimum 4 days in advance of the date of arrival with a window of 120 days.
- e-Visa will be valid for 60 days stay in India from the date of arrival in India.
- e-Visa can be availed for the maximum of two times in a calendar year i.e. between January to December.
- The Home Ministry has decided to enhance the e-visa scheme by including e-conference and e-medical attendant visa as well.

# 4. China successfully launched two remote-sensing satellites for Pakistan

- China successfully launched two remote sensing satellites for Pakistan, marking the first international commercial launch for the Long March-2C rocket in about 19 years.
- The satellites (a) PRSS-1 and (b) PakTES-1A - were launched from the Jiuquan Satellite Launch Centre in northwest China.
- The PRSS-1 is China's first optical remote sensing satellite sold to Pakistan.
- A scientific experiment satellite, PakTES-1A, developed by Pakistan, was sent into orbit via the same rocket.



 It is another space cooperation between China and Pakistan since the launch of PAKSAT-1R, a communication satellite, in August 2011.

# 5. Only one male Great Indian Bustard left in Gujarat

 There being only one male Great Indian Bustard (GIB) left in Gujarat's Kutch district have been confirmed by experts.

## Related Information Great Indian Bustards

- Found mostly in India and some regions of Pakistan, the GIB is considered a "critically endangered" bird in the IUCN Red List of threatened species.
- Currently, it is found in only six states in the country — Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, Maharashtra, Andhra Pradesh, Rajasthan and Karnataka.
- Rajasthan has the maximum number of GIBs and the bird is found in Jaisalmer, Barmer and Bikaner districts.
- The GIB plays a role in the germination of seeds in grasslands, and it is also a friend to farmers as it keeps a check on insects that destroy standing crops."
- GIB was found only in the Indian subcontinent. Hence, once the species is lost, there will be no other species to replace it, and that will destabilise the ecosystem of the grassland and affect critical biodiversities, as well as blackbucks and wolves, who share their habitat with the GIB.

# 6. Fish samples in Chennai test positive for formalin

 As many as 11 out of 30 samples of fish species purchased from Chinthadripet and Kasimedu, the two major fish markets in Chennai, have tested positive for formalin, a cancerinducing chemical used illegally to preserve fish.

- Fish industry experts said formalin or formaldehyde is sprayed on the fish or injected into the fish or the fish is dipped into the solution.
- This helps keep the fish fresh for a longer time.

- A clear aqueous solution of formaldehyde and methanol used especially as a preservative.
- Formalin causes irritation in the eyes, throat, skin and stomach.
- In the long run, continued exposure causes harm to the kidneys, liver and can even cause cancers.

# 1. FSSAI launches "Eat Right campaign" to curb consumption of sugar, salt and fat

- The Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) has initiated a campaign "Eat Right", wherein the key stakeholders like food processing industries and restaurants will volunteer to reduce the percentage of salt, sugar and fat content in food.
- As a part of the campaign, edible oil industries took a pledge to reduce trans-fat content by 2 Percent by 2022.
- Later, food companies also took a pledge to reformulate packaged foods with the reduced level of salt, sugar and saturated fat.
- This Eat Right Movement is a collaborative move with stakeholders—on both the demand and supply side—coming together.
- On the demand side, the campaign focuses on empowering citizens to make the right food choices.
- On the supply side, it nudges food businesses to reformulate their products, provide better nutritional information to consumers and make investments in healthy food as responsible food businesses.
- This is a voluntary movement from both the sides.

### Related Information Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI)

 It is an autonomous body established under the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare, Government of India.

- FSSAI was established by Government of India on 5 September 2008 under Food Safety and Standards Act, 2006.
- FSSAI is responsible for protecting and promoting public health through the regulation and supervision of food safety.
- The FSSAI consists of a chairperson & 22 members.
- The FSSAI has its headquarters at New Delhi.
- In May 2018, FSSAI launched the SNF@Workplace initiative (safe and nutritious food at the workplace) to improve the nutrition of millions of office going Indians.

# 2. Global Innovation Index ranks India the 57th most innovative nation

- The Global Innovation Index (GII) has ranked India as the 57th most innovative nation in the world.
- The country has improved its ranking from 60th position last year.
- Meanwhile, China improved its ranking from 22 in 2017 to 17 this year.
- The GII is being developed jointly by Cornell University, Insead and the World Intellectual Property Organisation (WIPO) in Geneva.
- GII ranks 126 economies based on 80 indicators.
- Since 2011, Switzerland has been ranked at the top every year.
- This year, the Netherlands follows at second place and Sweden at third.
- The US drops down to sixth from fourth last year.
- Although ranked at 57, India is a top performer in the lower middle-income group, where it is ranked at fifth position.



• It is the most innovative country in its region of central and southern Asia.

## 4. <u>India becomes world's sixth</u> largest economy

- India has become the world's sixthbiggest economy, pushing France into seventh place, according to updated World Bank figures for 2017.
- India's gross domestic product (GDP) amounted to \$2.597 trillion at the end of last year, against \$2.582 trillion for France.
- The country's economy rebounded strongly from July 2017, after several quarters of slowdown.
- India, with a population of around 1.34 billion, is poised to become the world's most populous nation, whereas the French population stands at 67 million.
- This means that India's per capita GDP continues to amount to just a fraction of that of France which is still roughly 20 times higher, according to World Bank figures.
- India has doubled its GDP within a decade and is expected to power ahead as a key economic engine in Asia, even as China slows down.
- At the end of 2017, Britain was still the world's fifth-biggest economy with a GDP of \$2.622 trillion.
- The US is the world's top economy, followed by China, Japan and Germany.

# 5. <u>UNSC adopts resolution 2427 to protect children in armed conflict</u>

- The UN Security Council has adopted a resolution aimed at a framework for mainstreaming protection, rights, well-being and empowerment of children throughout the conflict cycle.
- The resolution strongly condemns the recruitment and use of children by parties to armed conflict, killing and maiming, rape and other forms of sexual violence, and abductions.



- It demands that all relevant parties immediately put an end to such practices and take special measures to protect children.
- The resolution also emphasizes the responsibility of all states to put an end to impunity and to investigate and prosecute those responsible for genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes and other egregious crimes perpetrated against children.

- Bright pink pigments taken from marine black shales of the Taoudeni Basin in Mauritania, West Africa, were more than half a billion years older than the previous pigment discoveries.

# 1. Niti Aayog proposed a 15-point action plan 'Breathe India' to combat air pollution in ten most polluted cities

- Niti Aayog has proposed a 15-point action plan to combat air pollution in ten most polluted cities in the country, including Delhi, Kanpur and Varanasi.
- The draft action plan titled 'Breathe India' includes encouraging electric vehicles, phasing out private diesel vehicle and development of crop residue utilisation policy.

- The action plan also includes expediting strategic decommissioning of old and inefficient power plants and implementation of a large-scale feebate programme from 2020 onwards.
- The report also said there is a need to enact strong measures to curb vehicular emissions.
- It also called for concerted action from all levels of governance, cutting across ministries and departments.

## 3. <u>India's first private UAV factory to</u> come up in Kota

- India's first private sector unit for manufacturing unmanned air vehicles (UAV) and light bulletproof vehicles (LBPV) will be set up by DCM Shriram Industries Group on the campus of Shriram Rayons in Kota.
- These UAVs and LBPVs are likely to be used by defence and para-military forces in the country.
- The UAVs will be able to fly to a height of 500 to 2000 km, while LBPVs can operate in difficult terrains and has off-road abilities.

### 4. Net Neutrality rules approved by Telecom Commission

 India's Internet will be governed by the rules of net neutrality as the Telecom Commission has accepted the recommendations made by regulatory body TRAI (Telecom Regulatory Association of India).

- The net neutrality rules mean that Internet Service Providers (ISPs) cannot discriminate against Internet content and services by blocking, throttling or granting them higher speed access.
- India's acceptance of Net Neutrality is a big victory for the open Internet movement.
- It also means that zero-rating packages like says a Facebook Free Basics, where certain content is provided for free like access to Facebook, also remain illegal in India.

### **US and Net Neutrality**

- In the United States, the Net Neutrality rules expired recently after the US Federal Communications Commission (FCC) voted against them in November 2017.
- In the US, with no Net Neutrality, it is no longer illegal for ISPs to slow, block or offer "paid prioritisation" to some websites as long as they disclose these practices.
- This reversed the initial pro-Net Neutrality rules from 2015.

# What is out of the purview of Net Neutrality?

- The Telecom Commission has kept some mission-critical applications or services like remote surgery and autonomous cars out of the purview of this framework.
- TRAI in its recommendations had also kept CDN or content delivery networks out of the purview of Net Neutrality.
- CDNs allow a telecom company to deliver content on their network, without accessing the public internet.
- In order to access the content provided by them, the user has to be on the respective network.

- The holy figure depicted in a lotus position at the base of a granite cliff in northern Pakistan.
- The Buddha seated in a meditative posture considered one of the largest rock sculptures in South Asia.

### 2. <u>Telangana govt puts restrictions</u> <u>on glyphosate sale</u>

- The Telangana government's Department of Agriculture Cooperation and Family Welfare put restrictions on the sale of glyphosate on July 10, 2018.
- It is India's most popular broadspectrum herbicide, in a bid to curb the illegal use of herbicide-tolerant BT cotton.
- Though the herbicide is recommended for use only in tea plantations and non-crop areas, it is used across India to kill weeds.
- In India, the health impact has not been studied.
- However, the states have taken this action due to well-known adverse health impacts across the world.

- Glyphosate is a broad-spectrum systemic herbicide and crop desiccant.
- It is an organophosphorus compound, specifically a phosphonate.
- It is used to kill weeds, especially annual broadleaf weeds and grasses that compete with crops.
- It was discovered to be a herbicide by Monsanto chemist John E. Franz in 1970.
- Efforts to ban this chemical labelled carcinogenic, are on across the world.

 The Directorate General of Hydrocarbons (DGH) announced the completion of the first round of bidding under its new Open Acreage Licensing Policy (OALP), a part of the revamped Hydrocarbon Exploration and Licensing Policy (HELP).

5. **SpiNNaker: Novel computer mimics human brain networks** 

- Scientists have developed a computer "SpiNNaker" that mimics the brain's neural networks and could overcome the speed and power consumption problems of conventional supercomputers.
- The researchers compared the accuracy, speed and energy efficiency of SpiNNaker with that of NEST - a specialist supercomputer software currently in use for brain neuronsignalling research.
- The system may help advance our knowledge of neural processing in the brain, to include learning and disorders such as epilepsy and Alzheimer's disease.
- The ability to run large-scale detailed neural networks quickly and at low power consumption will advance robotics research and facilitate studies on learning and brain disorders.
- The human brain is extremely complex, comprising 100 billion interconnected brain cells.

# 4. <u>Scientists discovered a new source of neutrinos in space</u>

- Neutrinos extremely light, ghostly particles that barely interact with matter – have so far only been observed originating from supernovae (exploding stars) and the sun.
- Now a giant detector at the South Pole has discovered that a "blazar", a galaxy with a supermassive black hole at its centre, also produce neutrinos.

- These are only particle other than gravitational waves that can zip through the universe at speeds very close to that of light.

  - (c) tau neutrinos(vT)

## 3. <u>Upgraded Vikas engine will soon</u> boost ISRO's rockets

- All three satellite launch vehicles (PSLV, GSLV, GSLV MK-III) of the Indian Space Research Organisation (ISRO) are set to add muscle to their spacecraft lifting power in upcoming missions.
- The Vikas engine will improve the payload capability of PSLV, GSLV and GSLVMK-III launch vehicles.
- The main beneficiary of the highthrust Vikas engine is said to be the heavy-lifting GSLV-Mark III launcher, which ISRO expects will now put 4,000-kg satellites to space.
- This would be the third Mk-III and the first working one to be designated MKIII Mission-1 or M1.

### Note-

The first MKIII of June 2017 started with a 3,200-kg satellite and the second one is being readied for lifting a 3,500-kg spacecraft.

# 4. Andamans request delisting of saltwater crocodile from Schedule 1 of Wildlife Protection Act

- The government of the Andaman and Nicobar Islands has sent a proposal to the Central government requesting that saltwater crocodiles be delisted from Schedule 1 of the Wildlife Protection Act (WPA), 1972.
- The request has been raised in order for the Andaman authorities to control the growing saltwater crocodile population in the islands and the resultant rise in human-croc conflicts.
- The proposal was sent three months ago and is awaiting consideration.

Wildlife Protection Act 1972



- The Wildlife Protection Act, 1972 is an Act of the Parliament of India enacted for the protection of plants and animal species.
- It extends to the whole of India, except the State of Jammu and Kashmir which has its own wildlife act.
- It has six schedules which give varying degrees of protection.
- Schedule I and part II of Schedule II provide absolute protection - offences under these are prescribed the highest penalties.
- Species listed in Schedule III and Schedule IV are also protected, but the penalties are much lower.
- Schedule V includes the animals which may be hunted.
- The specified endemic plants in Schedule VI are prohibited from cultivation and planting.

#### **Look Further**

- Under the Wildlife Protection Act, 1972, states can request the Centre to declare some species as "vermin" if their population becomes unmanageable, thereby removing protections assured by the Act.
- Essentially, the species can then be hunted or culled.
- The Central Government may declare any wild animal other than those specified in Sch. I and part 11 of Sch. H to be vermin for any area, so long as such notification is in force, such wild animal shall be deemed to have been included in Sch. V.
- The National Wildlife Action Plan (2017-31) calls for "comprehensive, science-based species-specific and region-specific, conflict mitigation plans that can help in the prevention of human-wildlife conflict situations.

- After being classified as 'endangered' in 1997 and added to the Red List, this is the first time that red sanders have been shifted to a better-conserved category.
- Red sanders wood fetches huge prices in the international market for its use in making luxury products, musical instruments and medicine.
- However, as the species is endemic to India and had been considered endangered, the Foreign Trade Policy of India doesn't allow its export.
- This ban, coupled with its high demand, made an illegal trade of red sanders rampant in states where it is found like Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka and Tamil Nadu.

# 2. WCD Ministry set to move Cabinet to make child marriage void

- In India, child marriage between a man under 21 years and a woman under 18 are merely voidable at the behest of the contracting parties.
- UNICEF's 2014 report puts India at 6th spot, among the top-10 countries, regarding high rates of child marriage among women.
- The present law on child marriage PCMA- the Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, 2006, does not invalidate child marriages.
- It only gives the child bride and the groom the option of annulling it if a case is filed in a district court by either of the two contracting parties within two years of becoming adult, or through a guardian in case, they are still minors.

#### Note

The Hindu Marriage Act, 1955, (for Hindus, Buddhists, Sikhs, Jains) and the Dissolution of Muslim Marriages Act, 1939, do not still hold child marriages to be void.

# Related information The Prohibition of Child Marriage Act, 2006

- PCMA came into force on 1st November 2007 by replacing the earlier legislation of Child Marriage Restraint Act, 1929.
- The object of the Act is to prohibit solemnization of child marriage and connected incidental matters. This new Act is armed with enabling provisions to prohibit for child marriage, protect and provide relief to the victim and enhance punishment for those who abet, promote or solemnize such marriage.

# 3. Supreme Court asks the Parliament to make lynching a separate offence

- Physically challenged/disabled convicts: With 70 per cent disability and more, who have completed 50 per cent of their actual sentence period.

### Special remission will not be given to:

- Prisoners who have been convicted for the death sentence.
- Cases involving in serious and heinous crimes like rape, human trafficking, dowry death and convicted under UAPA, POTA, TADA, FICN, POCSO, etc

6. Cabinet approves the Trafficking of Persons (Prevention, Protection and Rehabilitation)
Bill, 2018

### Features of the bill

- It takes into consideration aggravated forms of trafficking, which includes trafficking for the purpose of forced labour, begging, trafficking of a woman or child for the purpose of marriage or under the pretext of marriage or after marriage etc.
- It deals with punishment for promoting or facilitating trafficking of the person.
- It deals with the confidentiality of victims/ witnesses and complainants by not disclosing their identity.
- The **confidentiality of the victims** is maintained by recording their statement through video conferencing (this also helps in transborder and inter-State crimes).
- National Investigation Agency (NIA) will perform the tasks of Anti-Trafficking Bureau at the national level present under the MHA.
- Punishment ranges from rigorous minimum 10 years to life and fine not less than Rs. 1 lakh.
- The National Anti-Trafficking Bureau will perform the functions of international coordination with authorities in other countries.

- It hiked Rs. 20 per quintal (higher by 77.42% over production) in the FRP of sugarcane at Rs. 275 per quintal for the basic recovery rate of 10%.
- The cost of production of sugarcane for the sugar season 2018-19 is Rs. 155 per quintal.
- This ensures that the farmers get the return of more than 50% over their production cost.
- The Government with a view to protecting the interest of farmers has also decided that there shall not be any deduction in case of mills where recovery is below 9.5%. Such farmers will get Rs. 261.25 per quintal for sugarcane in place of Rs. 255/qtl in the current season.

### Related Information Fair and Remunerative Price

- The FRP has been determined on the basis of recommendations of Commission for Agricultural Costs and Prices (CACP) and after consultation with State Governments and other stakeholders.
- Recommended FRP is arrived by taking into account various factors such as the cost of production, overall demand-supply situation, domestic and international prices, inter-crop price parity, terms of trade prices of primary by-products, and likely impact of FRP on the general price level and resource use efficiency.

### 9. <u>Scientists discovered 12 new</u> moons orbiting Jupiter

- Scientists have discovered 12 new moons orbiting Jupiter, bringing the grand total of known Jovian satellites to 79.
- The mere existence of these newly discovered moons provides missing clues about the formation of the solar system.
- The discovery includes 11 normal outer moons and one oddball.
- Jupiter's satellites orbit the planet at three different distances. Out of the new moons, 9 are part of a distant outer swarm of moons orbiting in the retrograde (opposite direction of Jupiter's spin rotation).
- Of them, the 2 new discoveries are part of a closer, inner group of moons that orbit in the prograde (same direction as Jupiter's rotation).
- The researchers named the wayward moon Valetudo, after the Roman god Jupiter's great-granddaughter. It was the faintest of the objects, which makes it not only the palest Jovian moon ever discovered, but likely the smallest, as well.

2. **Dolphin population declines in India's only dolphin sanctuary** 

- Dredging, freight transport, pollution, and a lack of management plan leaves India's only dolphin sanctuary, Vikramshila Gangetic Dolphin Sanctuary (VGDS) in Bihar's Bhagalpur district, under threat.
- The number of dolphins in the sanctuary had declined to 154 from 207 in 2015.
- Dredging activity has increased manifold in recent years because the current Indian government has declared the stretch of the Ganga from Varanasi to Haldia in West Bengal National Waterway- 1.
- The experts involved in the survey blamed increasing pollution, human interference, siltation and decreasing water flow and water level in the river.

# 4. Toxins found yet again, this time in PET bottles of five soft drinks brands

- At least 5 different toxins have been found in soft drinks produced by two multinational beverage companies— PepsiCo and Coca-Cola.
- A government-led study, commissioned by the Drugs Technical Advisory Board (DTAB), which comes under the Health Ministry, has revealed the presence of heavy metals like antimony, lead, chromium and cadmium along with the compound DEHP or Di(2-ethylhexyl) phthalate in samples of Pepsi, Coca-Cola, Mountain Dew, Sprite and 7Up.
- All these samples were taken from the Polyethylene terephthalate (PET).
- According to the World Health Organisation (WHO), lead and cadmium are among the top ten chemicals of "major public health concern".

 These beverages cause deaths to about 200,000 people every year due to diabetes, cardiovascular disease and cancers.

#### **Related Information**

- Lead can have serious consequences for children as it attacks the brain and central nervous system, causing coma, convulsions and even death. Survivors of lead poisoning may live with mental retardation and behavioural disorders
- Cadmium, on the other hand, affects the kidneys, skeletal system and respiratory system. It is also considered a human carcinogen.
- Antimony, chromium and DEHP are known to cause serious side effects on the body.

### **Drugs Technical Advisory Board (DTAB)**

- Highest statutory decision-making body on technical matters related to drugs.
- Constituted as per the Drugs and Cosmetics Act, 1940.
- Part of the Central Drugs Standard Control Organization (CDSCO) under the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.

# 5. Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education (Second Amendment) Bill, 2017

- The Lok Sabha on Wednesday passed a Bill to amend the Right to Education (RTE) Act to abolish the "nodetention" policy in schools. No student can be detained up to class 8, under current provisions of the Act.
- The Bill amends this provision to state that a regular examination will be held in class 5 and class 8 at the end of every academic year.
- If a child fails the exam, he will be given additional instruction, and take a re-examination.
- If he fails in the re-examination, the relevant central or state government may decide to allow schools to detain the child.

# Related Information No -Detention Policy



- No- Detention policy states that no child admitted in a school shall be held back in any class.
- S. R. Subramanian committee has recommended that the no detention policy must be continued for young children until completion of class V when the child will be 11 years old.
- Schools are supposed to hold Continuous and Comprehensive Evaluations (CCE) for every child, instead of exams.

# 1. <u>India to expand polar research to</u> the Arctic as well

- Three decades after its first mission to Antarctica, the government is refocusing priorities to the Arctic because of opportunities and challenges posed by climate change.
- Recently India has renamed the National Centre for Antarctic and Ocean Research (NCAOR) as the National Centre for Polar and Ocean Research.

#### Note-

**NCAOR**- Since 1998, charged with conducting expeditions to India's base stations to the continent.

 It's also in talks with Canada and Russia, key countries with the presence in the Arctic circle, to establish new observation systems, according to a source.



- Now, India only has one Arctic observation station near Norway.
- India is already an observer at the Arctic Council.

#### Note-

#### **Arctic Council**

- It is a forum of countries that decide on managing the region's resources and popular livelihood.
- In 2015, India set up an underground observatory, called IndARC, at the Kongsfjorden fjord, halfway between Norway and the North Pole.

## Why does India concern?

- A big worry for India is the impact of melting sea ice on the monsoon.
- Over the years scientists across the world are reporting that the rapid icemelt in the Arctic is leading to large quantities of fresh water into the seas around the poles.
- This impedes the release of heat from the water and directs warm water into the seas around India, the theory goes, and eventually weakens the movement of the monsoon breeze into India.

# 3. Most advanced System of Air Quality and Weather Forecasting (SAFAR) at Chandni Chowk in Delhi.

- State-of-the-art Air Quality and Weather Forecast System- SAFAR (System of Air Quality and Weather Forecasting) was unveiled at Chandni Chowk
- The giant true colour LED display gives out real-time air quality index on 24x7 basis with colour coding along with 72-hour advance forecast.
- The air quality station will also measure the sun's UV-Index and will provide the measurement of online automatic ultrafine particles PM1 and Mercury, both of which have direct relevance to human health. Based on UVI, skin advisories will be issued on display.
- SAFAR will accelerate public awareness and preparedness of air pollution and weather extremes.
- It will monitor all weather parameters like temperature, rainfall, humidity, wind speed and wind direction.
- In addition to regular air quality parameters like PM2.5, PM10, Sulfur Dioxide, Ozone, Nitrogen Oxides, Carbon Monoxide, the system will also monitor the existence of Benzene, Toluene and Xylene.



# Related Information Air Quality Index

- Air Quality Index (AQI) is one such tool for effective dissemination of air quality information to people.
- There are six AQI categories, namely Good, Satisfactory, Moderately polluted, Poor, Very Poor, and Severe.
- The AQI considers eight pollutants (PM10, PM2.5, NO2, SO2, CO, O3, NH3, and Pb) for which short-term (up to 24-hourly averaging period) National Ambient Air Quality Standards are prescribed.

# Related Information No- Confidence Motion

- A motion of no-confidence is a statement or vote which states that a person(s) in a position of responsibility (government, managerial, etc.) is no longer deemed fit to hold that position.
- Article 75(3) of our Constitution of India embodies this rule by specifying that Council of Ministers is collectively responsible to Lok Sabha. But there is no mention of a no-confidence motion in the constitution.
- As a Parliamentary Motion, it demonstrates to the Head of the state that the elected parliament no longer has confidence in (one or more members of) the appointed Government.

#### **Privilege motion**

- As per the Constitution, all members of the Parliament enjoy certain rights and immunities – this is also referred to as Parliamentary Privilege which is enjoyed both by the Parliament and the members in their individual capacity.
- Privilege motion refers to a notice by any member of either House of a state legislature or Parliament, against anyone members who are accused of breach of privilege.

- The Secretaries of the justice, legal affairs, legislative, and social justice and empowerment departments are members of the committee.
- The government has also decided to constitute a Group of Ministers (GoM) headed by Home Minister Singh to consider the recommendations of the high-level committee of the Secretaries.
- External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj, Road Transport Minister Nitin Gadkari, Law Minister Ravi Shankar Prasad and Social Justice and Empowerment Minister Thawar Chand Gehlot are members of the Group of Ministers.

- The interim compensation may be paid where the drawer pleads not guilty of the accusation.
- The compensation will not exceed 20
   Percent of the cheque amount and will have to be paid by the drawer within 60 days of the court's order.

# 3. Parliament passes Prevention of Corruption (Amendment) Bill

- The Lok Sabha passed the Prevention of Corruption (Amendment) Bill, 2018 that seeks to punish bribe-givers and bribe-takers.
- The Bill provides for jail terms of three to seven years, besides fine, to those convicted of taking or giving bribes to public officials.
- The Bill also extends the ambit of public servants who will be protected by the provision of a prior government sanction for prosecution.



 There is also a provision now to get prior permission for starting an investigation and that has prompted many to say that the law has been "diluted" from its original draft.

#### What is new

- Giving a bribe is now an offence, punishable by a 7-year prison term
- Except when one is forced to give a bribe. But it should be reported within seven days
- Bribe is termed 'undue advantage', defined as 'gratification other than legal remuneration'

#### What it was

 No specific provision, except as abetment

It could empower the public to refuse to give a bribe but seven-day limit may not be enough . As to what happens if citizen's report of coercion is not registered by the police is unclear



#### Pre-investigation approval

#### What is new

 Police officer cannot begin probe without prior approval of relevant authority or govt (except when caught red-handed)

#### What it was

 No such provision in the Act, but a rule similar to it was struck down by Supreme Court

Protection formerly available to officials of rank of joint secretary and above (before SC struck it down) is extended to all public servants

 There were five kinds: omitted ones are taking bribe habitually, getting anything free or at a concession, obtaining pecuniary advantage for oneself or for another without public interest

This is to protect public servants from being wrongly prosecuted for official decisions. Earlier it was a crime to "obtain advantage to a private party without public interest"



#### Forfeiture of property

#### What is new

 Section introduced for Special Court under this Act to attach and confiscate property

#### What it was

 This was not done under the Prevention of Corruption Act, but under a 1944 ordinance through civil courts

This helps avoid a fresh procedure to confiscate property obtained through corruption, enables court conducting trial to do so itself

# 4. The sharp decline in maternal, infant mortality rates in India

- India has achieved a remarkable feat in arresting maternal and infant mortality rates and would surpass SDG goals of reducing maternal mortality to 70 per lakh live births by 2025 instead of the target of 2030.
- The maternal mortality rate (MMR) per lakh live births has reduced to 130 in the country while there has been a significant improvement in checking infant mortality rate (IMR) deaths.
- Kerala, Tamil Nadu and Maharashtra have shown significant performance.
- The low performing states are Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Bihar, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, Assam, Rajasthan, Odisha and Jammu and Kashmir.

 Infant Mortality Rate refers to the deaths of infants under the age of one year per 1,000 live births.

#### **Maternal Mortality Rate**

 Maternal mortality Rate refers to the number of women who die as a result of pregnancy and childbirth complications per 100,000 live births in a given year.

### Janani Suraksha Yojna (JSY)

## 1. Fugitive Economic Offenders Bill, 2018

 The bill, replacing the ordinance seeks to deter economic offenders from escaping the country and lays down provisions for escaped offenders to return to India and submit themselves to the process of law.

## **Key Features:**

- The bill empowers authorities to attach and confiscate the properties and assets of economic offenders.
- It seeks to target fugitives for offences exceeding **₹100 crore.**
- The bill will extend not only to loan defaulters and fraudsters but also to individuals who violate laws governing taxes, black money, benami properties and financial corruption.
- All individuals attempting to evade the Indian legal process from the date of the enactment of the law will be covered.
- The confiscation of property will not be limited to those acquired through the proceeds or profits of the crime.
- The bill also provides for confiscation of benami properties.



 Those classified as fugitives will also not be able to pursue civil cases in India unless they come back to India and face prosecution.

## Related Information Fugitive Economic Offender

 A Fugitive Economic Offender is a person against whom an arrest warrant has been issued in respect of a scheduled offence and who has left India so as to avoid criminal prosecution, or being abroad, refuses to return to India to face criminal prosecution.

### **Scheduled offence**

 A scheduled offence refers to a list of economic offences contained in the Schedule of the bill.

# 2. Scheme to compensate victims of sexual assaults should include children: SC.

- The Supreme Court said that a scheme proposed by the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA) for compensating victims of sexual assault and acid attack should be modified to "some extent" to make it applicable to child victims of such assaults.
- The bench suggested that the Compensation Scheme for Women Victims/Survivors of Sexual Assault/Other Crimes, 2018, proposed by the National Legal Services Authority, include child victims.

# Related Information Compensation Scheme for Women Victims/Survivors of Sexual Assault/Other Crimes, 2018

- The National Legal Services Authority's scheme proposes a uniform payment of ₹5 lakh to the maximum of ₹10 lakh to gang-rape survivors in any part of the country.
- In the case of rape and unnatural sexual assault, the victim will get a minimum of ₹4 lakh and the maximum of ₹7 lakh.

- For an acid attack victim minimum of ₹7 lakh in case of disfigurement of a face. The upper limit will be ₹8 lakh.
- In acid attack cases, if the injury is more than 50%, a minimum compensation of ₹5 lakh will be given and the maximum will be ₹8 lakh.

# National Legal Services Authority of India (NALSA)

- NALSA was formed on 5<sup>th</sup> December 1995 under the authority of the Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987.
- Its purpose is to provide free legal services to eligible candidates and to organize Lok Adalats for speedy resolution of cases.
- The Chief Justice of India is patron-inchief of NALSA while 2nd most judge of Supreme Court of India is the Executive-Chairman.
- The prime objective of NALSA is speedy disposal of cases and reducing the burden of the judiciary.

# 7. World's fastest man-made spinning object developed.

- Scientists have developed the fastest man-made rotor in the world, which they believe will help them study quantum mechanics.
- At more than 60 billion revolutions per minute, this machine is more than 100,000 times faster than a highspeed dental drill.
- The team synthesized a tiny dumbbell from silica and levitated it in the high vacuum using a laser.
- The laser can work in a straight line or in a circle - when it is linear, the dumbbell vibrates, and when it is circular, the dumbbell spins.



- A spinning dumbbell functions as a rotor, and a vibrating dumbbell functions like an instrument for measuring tiny forces and torques, known as a torsion balance.
- As they become more advanced, they will be able to study things like quantum mechanics and the properties of the vacuum.

# 8. Government amends the definition of hydrocarbon to include shale.

- The government has amended the Petroleum and Natural Gas Rules 1959 to include shale in the definition of petroleum, a change that would allow private companies to explore and produce the resource in the blocks they already operate.
- It would help in enhancing domestic exploration and production of hydrocarbons and increasing India's energy security and reducing dependency on imports.
- It would open up exploration of all hydrocarbons in existing fields which is line with the new Hydrocarbon Exploration Licensing Policy (HELP)

# Related Information Amended definition of Petroleum

 Petroleum means naturally occurring hydrocarbons, whether in the form of natural gas or in a liquid, viscous or solid form, or a mixture thereof, but does not include coal, lignite, and helium occurring in association with petroleum or coal or shale.

#### Shale

 Shale is a fine-grained, clastic sedimentary rock composed of mud that is a mix of flakes of clay minerals and tiny fragments (silt-sized particles) of other minerals, especially quartz and calcite.

#### **Shale Gas**

- Shale gas is natural gas that is found trapped within shale formations. It is colourless, odourless gas, lighter than air.
- It is cheaper than natural gas, releases lesser carbon dioxide.
- It is an unconventional source of methane.

#### 9. Lake found on Mars by scientists.

- Using a radar instrument on an orbiting spacecraft, scientists have spotted a sizeable salt-laden lake under the ice on the southern polar plain of Mars, a body of water they called a possible habitat for microbial life.
- The reservoir they detected roughly 20 km in diameter, shaped like a rounded triangle and located about 1.5 km beneath the ice surface represents the first stable body of liquid water ever found on Mars.
- The location's radar profile resembled that of subglacial lakes found beneath Earth's Antarctic and Greenland ice sheets.
- The detection was made using data collected between May 2012 and December 2015 by an instrument aboard the European Space Agency's Mars Express spacecraft that transmits radar pulses, which penetrate the Martian surface and ice caps.
- Because it is located beneath the polar ice cap, the temperature in the lake is expected to be below the freezing point of pure water.

# Related Information MARSIS (Mars Advanced Radar for Subsurface and Ionosphere Sounding)

- MARSIS is a low frequency, pulselimited radar sounder and altimeter used on the European Space Agency, Mars Express mission.
- It features ground-penetrating radar capabilities, which uses synthetic aperture techniques and a second receiving antenna to isolate subsurface reflections



 MARSIS was funded and developed by ASI (Italy) and NASA (USA).

- Its World Network of Biosphere Reserves currently counts 686 sites in 122 countries all over the world, including 20 transboundary sites.

 The Bill provides for the establishment of Anti-Trafficking Relief and Rehabilitation Committees (ATCs) at the national, state, and district levels.

# 9. West Bengal Assembly passes the resolution to rename State as 'Bangla'



- The West Bengal Assembly passed a resolution to change the name of the State as 'Bangla' in three languages — Bengali, English and Hindi.
- The state will now have to wait for a nod from the Union home ministry for the resolution's final approval.
- The move was aimed at climbing the alphabetical sequence of state names in which West Bengal appears last in the list now.

#### Note

 When the fresh proposal comes to the Home Ministry, it will prepare a note for the Union Cabinet for an amendment to the **Schedule 1** of the Constitution. Thereafter, a Constitution Amendment Bill will be introduced in Parliament, which has to approve it with a simple majority, before the President gives his assent to it.

### 1. National Achievement Survey

- The National Achievement Survey (NAS) is the largest ever national assessment survey in the country and is amongst the largest in the world.
- NAS is a representative sample of schools from all districts in India aimed at understanding the health of the education system in government and government-aided schools.
- National Achievement Survey is conducted by National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT) and supported by Ministry of Human Resource and Development.
- It assesses the learning levels of the students in Classes 3, 5, 8 and 10.
- The survey tool uses multiple test booklets in Mathematics, Modern Indian Language, English, Sciences and Social Sciences.
- In order to increase focus on the quality of elementary education, The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act (RTE) Act,

- 2009 has been amended to include the reference on class-wise, subjectwise Learning Outcomes.
- The design and implementation of the survey included in its ambit the school leaders, teachers and the whole network of officials at the Cluster, Block, District Institute of Education and Training (DIET), State Council of Educational Research and Training (SCERT) and the Directorates of Education in the different States/ UTs.

# 3. New Ebola species is reported for the first time in a decade.

 The government of Sierra Leone has announced that a new species of Ebola, the sixth, has been discovered there in bats. It has been called, provisionally, the **Bombali virus**, after a district in the north of the country where it was found.



- Researchers working in joint US-West African study funded by US Aid have discovered the new strain of Ebola virus in bats in northern Bombali region of Sierra Leone.
- It's not known whether the new strain can develop into the deadly Ebola disease if transmitted to humans.
- There's no evidence the new virus has infected people, although EcoHealth Alliance, an environmental nonprofit group involved in the discovery, said that it has the potential to infect human cells.

#### **Related Information**

- The worst-ever Ebola outbreak started in December 2013 in southern Guinea before spreading to Liberia and Sierra Leone.
- The West African outbreak was caused by the Zaire species, which has historically been the most deadly in humans since it was first identified in 1976.
- Sierra Leone is one of three in West Africa that was engulfed in a devastating Ebola outbreak in 2014 and 2015. The outbreak was caused by the ebolavirus known as Zaire ebolavirus.
- There are five known species of Ebola: the Zaire virus, sometimes simply called Ebola; Sudan ebolavirus; Bundibugyo; Täi Forest; and Reston.
- Bats are believed to be the natural reservoir of all Ebola species, but to date, no one has managed to isolate live Ebola viruses from bats.

#### **Ebola Virus**

Ebola virus is a highly fatal haemorrhagic fever that is spread through contact with bodily fluids from infected persons and animals which include non-human primates, bats and forest antelope. Zaire strain of Ebola virus is the most deadly strain known.

4. <u>Justice Srikrishna committee</u> <u>submits the report on data</u> protection

- The draft personal data protection Bill 2018, submitted by the Justice B.N. Srikrishna-headed expert panel, has proposed that critical personal data of Indian citizens be processed in centres located within the country.
- The Justice BN Srikrishna committee has stated that regulations suggested in the draft data protection bill will require the government to make changes to the Aadhaar Act.

### **Key recommendation:**

- 1. It has left it to the Central government to notify categories of personal data that will be considered as critical.
- 2. Other personal data may be transferred outside the territory of India with some riders.
- The committee has recommended two changes to the Aadhaar Act:
- 1. Better safeguarding of Aadhaar data.
- 2. Autonomy of the UIDAI.
- 3. At least one copy of the data will need to be stored in India.
- The draft also provides for penalties for data processor as well as compensation to data principal to be imposed for violations of the data protection law.
- 5. It has suggested a penalty of ₹15 crore or 4% of the total worldwide turnover of any data collection/processing entity, for violating provisions.
- Failure to take prompt action on a data security breach can attract up to ₹5 crore or 2% of turnover as a penalty.
- The draft Bill, which has recommended that a Data Protection Authority be set up to prevent misuse of personal information, also provides for setting up an Appellate Tribunal.

# Related Information UIDAI(Unique Identification Authority of India)

 UIDAI is a statutory authority established under the provisions of the Aadhaar (Targeted Delivery of Financial and Other Subsidies,



Benefits and Services) Act, 2016 ("Aadhaar Act 2016") on 12 July 2016 by the Government of India, under the Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology (MeitY).

- The UIDAI or is the nodal agency that manages the Aadhaar biometric identification system.
- The first UID number was issued on 29 September 2010 to a resident of Nandurbar, Maharashtra.

# 5. NCPCR mediation cell for women fleeing with kids from abroad to escape domestic violence.

- A mediation cell has been opened on the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights(NCPCR) website to register complaints of Indians who have fled with their children from abroad to escape domestic violence or some other issue.
- The cell consisting of members of the Ministry of External Affairs and the NCPCR, would contact the embassies of the respective countries and try to reach a solution after consultations with them.
- Maneka Gandhi recommended members of the women commissions to follow three things — release a book on the performance every year, identify single cases and try to solve them and hire lawyers for women who cannot afford it.

# Related Information The National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR)

- The National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR) is a statutory body under the Commissions for Protection of Child Rights (CPCR) Act, 2005 under the administrative control of the Ministry of Women & Child Development, Government of India.
- The objective of this commission is to protect, promote and defend the child rights in India including the rights adopted in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Children, 1989, ratified by India in 1992.

- This convention defines the child as a human being below 18 years of age.
- This commission has a chairperson and six members of which at least two should be women.
- All of them are appointed by the Central Government for three years.
- The maximum age to serve in commission is 65 years for Chairman and 60 years for members.

### The Hague Convention

- The Hague Convention is a multinational treaty that seeks to protect children wrongfully removed by one of the parents from the custody of the other parent.
- Located in The Netherlands.
- Effective from 1st December 1983.
- There are 98 member countries.
- India is not a member of the Hague Convention.

### 7. <u>Mukhyamantri Agriculture-cum-</u> Solar Scheme



- By Delhi Government
- The scheme which attempts to increase solar installations while consequently providing relief to Delhi's agricultural sector, offers very little for any of the stakeholders involved other than well-off, large landowning farmers.
- The scheme aims to hit two birds with one stone by attempting to increase solar installations while providing relief to Delhi's agricultural sector at the same time.
- It aims is to entice solar developers to build power generating plants on agricultural holdings. The farmers are to be paid Rs 1lakh/acre by the developers for leasing the land, with a 6 per cent annual escalation.
- The premise of the scheme is to supplement farmers' income, currently estimated at Rs 20,000– 30,000/acre. Additionally, they are allowed 1000kWh/acre of free electricity generated by the system.

## 5. National Viral Hepatitis Control Program

- Union Minister of Health and Family Welfare, Mr J P Nadda, in collaboration with the World Health Organisation, launched the National Viral Hepatitis Control Program to mark the World Hepatitis Day, 2018.
- It is a part of the National Health Mission.
- The goal is to end viral hepatitis as a **public health threat by 2030**.
- The aim of the initiative is to reduce morbidity and mortality due to viral hepatitis.
- The key strategies include:
- 1. Preventive and promotive interventions with the focus on awareness generation.
- 2. Safe injection practices and sociocultural practices.
- 3. Sanitation and hygiene.
- 4. Safe drinking water supply.
- 5. Infection control and immunization.
- Treatment centres will be designated to provide free anti-viral to hepatitis C patients and hepatitis B vaccine to babies born to mothers carrying the virus within 24 hours of birth.

### Related information National Health Mission

- National Health Mission was launched by the government of India in 2013 subsuming the National Rural Health Mission and the National Urban Health Mission. It was further extended in March 2018, to continue till March 2020.
- NHM envisages achievement of universal access to equitable, affordable & quality health care services that are accountable and responsive to people's needs.
- It seeks to ensure the achievement of the following indicators.

- The DigiYatra programme is expected to be initially rolled out at airports in Bengaluru, Hyderabad, Kolkata, Varanasi and Vijayawada.

# Related Information UPI(Unified Payments Interface)

- Unified Payments Interface is a payment system through which investors can link more than one bank account in their smartphone app and make fund transfers instantly without having to provide IFSC code or account number.
- An investor will only have to use a virtual address, known as a Virtual Payment Address (VPA), which is like our email ID, to carry out the transaction. VPA is an identifier that is created by the user by linking his bank account to the mobile payment application.
- UPI, which was developed by the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI), is regulated by the RBI.



• Some of the UPI apps available are BHIM, PhonePe and Google Tez.

## 8. <u>India to give flash flood warning</u> to Asian nations.

- India has been designated as a nodal centre for preparing flash-flood forecasts by the World Meteorological Organization (WMO).
- That means India will have to develop a customised model that can issue an advance warning of floods in Vietnam, Sri Lanka, Myanmar and Thailand.
- IMD would be working to customise a weather model, developed by the United States and donated to the WMO, to warn of flash floods at least six hours in advance.
- The proposed model would provide forecasts by computing the likelihood of rainfall and the soil moisture levels to warn of possible floods, he said. Though Pakistan was among the list of countries that would benefit from the forecast, it had refused to participate in the scheme.

### Related information Central Water Commission

- In India, the Central Water Commission monitors India's dams, warns of rising water levels in the reservoirs, which are usually taken to be signs of imminent floods.
- It was formed in 1945.
- Under the Ministry of Water Resources, River Development & Ganga Rejuvenation.
- To promote integrated and sustainable development and management of India's Water Resources by using state-of-art technology and competency and coordinating all stake holders.

**Note-**The organisation has recently tied up with Google to develop a software application to visualise rising water levels during heavy rains.

- The World Meteorological Organization is a specialized agency of the United Nations.
- With a membership of 191 Member States and Territories.

- It originated from the International Meteorological Organization, which was founded in 1873.

# 1. <u>Criminal Law (Amendment) Bill 2018.</u>

- The Lok Sabha has passed the Criminal Law (Amendment) Bill 2018 which replaces the Criminal Law (Amendment) Ordinance promulgated on April 21 this year.
- The bill stipulates stringent punishment for perpetrators of rape, particularly of girls below 12 years and the death sentence has been provided for rapists of girls under 12 years.
- In case of rape of a girl under 16 years, the minimum punishment has been increased from 10 to 20 years, extendable to life imprisonment.
- The punishment for the gangrape of a girl below 16 years will invariably be imprisonment for the rest of life of the convict. The measure also provides for speedy investigations and trial.
- The time limit for the investigation of all cases of rape has been prescribed, which has to be mandatorily completed within two months.
- The deadline for the completion of the trial in all rape cases will be two months
- A six-month time limit for the disposal of appeals in rape cases has also been prescribed
- It has also been prescribed that a court has to give notice of 15 days to a public prosecutor and the representative of the victim before deciding on bail applications in case of rape of a girl under 16 years of age.

- 2. The United States elevates India's status to ease export controls for high-technology product sales.
- The US has eased export controls for high-technology product sales to India by designating it as a **Strategic Trade Authorization-1 (STA-1)**

#### **Related Information**

- The granting of STA-1 status to India comes after the US recognised India as a Major Defence Partner in 2016, a designation that allows India to buy more advanced and sensitive technologies from America at par with that of the US closest allies and partners, and ensures enduring cooperation into the future.
- The designation authorises the export, re-export and transfer of specified items on the Commerce Control List (CCL) to destinations posing a low risk of unauthorised or impermissible uses.
- Currently, there are 36 countries on the STA-1 list.
- India is the only South Asian country to be on the list.
- Other Asian countries designated as STA-1 are **Japan and South Korea**.

### 3. **Deep Ocean mission**

- Centre has drawn up a five-year, ₹8,000 crore plan to explore the deep recesses of the ocean.
- The Union Earth Sciences Ministry unveiled a blueprint of the 'Deep Ocean Mission (DOM)'.
- The focus will be on technologies for deep-sea mining, underwater vehicles, underwater robotics and ocean climate change advisory services, among other aspects.
- The mission proposes to explore the deep ocean similar to the space exploration started by ISRO about 35 years ago.
- India has been allotted a site of 75,000 square kilometres in the Central Indian Ocean Basin (CIOB) by the UN International Sea Bed Authority for exploitation of polymetallic nodules (PMN).

 These are rocks scattered on the seabed containing iron, manganese, nickel and cobalt.

# Related Information International Seabed Authority (ISA)

- International Seabed Authority (ISA) is a UN body set up to regulate the exploration and exploitation of marine non-living resources of oceans in international waters.
- It was established under the 1982 United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS). Its headquarters are in Kingston, Jamaica.
- India actively contributes to the work of the International Seabed Authority.
- India was re-elected as a member of Council of ISA in 2016.

### **Polymetallic Nodules**

- Polymetallic nodules, also called manganese nodules, are rock concretions on the sea bottom formed of concentric layers of iron and manganese hydroxides around a core.
- The core may be microscopically small and is sometimes completely transformed into manganese minerals by crystallization.

# 4. National Advanced Surface-to-Air Missile System-II (NASAMS-II).

- India is in talks with the U.S. to procure an advanced air defence system to defend the National Capital Region (NCR) from aerial attacks. The process for procuring the National Advanced Surface-to-Air Missile System-II (NASAMS-II), estimated at \$1 billion, has been initiated.
- This system will help in preventing 9/11-type attacks [when terrorists flew hijacked planes into New York's World Trade Center] on Delhi. It is in the Acceptance of Necessity (AoN) stage now.
- It is the state-of-the-art defence system that has the ability to quickly identify and destroy enemy aircraft, UAV or emerging cruise missile threats.



# Related Information NASAMS

- The NASAMS was developed by Raytheon in partnership with KONGSBERG Defence and Aerospace of Norway.
- The NASAMS, armed with the threedimensional Sentinel radars short and medium-range missiles, launchers, fire-distribution centres and command-and-control units to quickly detect, track and shoot down multiple airborne threats.
- Part of the air defence network guarding US capital city Washington DC and also deployed in several NATO countries.

#### **NASAMS-II**

NASAMS-II is an upgraded version of the NASAMS and features new 3D mobile surveillance radars and 12 missile launchers for quicker reaction. It has been operational since 2007.

# 5. Manipur People's Protection Bill, 2018.

- The Manipur People's Protection Bill, 2018 seeks to regulate the entry and exit of "outsiders" on the lines of the British-era inner-line permit system prevalent in three other north-eastern states: Arunachal Pradesh, Mizoram and Nagaland.
- The bill sets 1951 as the base year to identify locals and prevent an influx of outsiders.
- According to the bill, Manipur people include Meitis, the Pangal Muslims, scheduled tribes as listed under the Constitution in terms of Manipur and all those citizens of India who have been living in Manipur before 1951.
- The rest have been put in the category of Non-Manipuris and will have to register themselves within one month of the notification of the law.
- Many people from the Kuki-Zomi groups are believed to have migrated from adjoining Myanmar before and after 1951.

 Trade licences can get a pass extendable up to five years, which will have to be renewed every year. Any outsider visiting Manipur would need a pass.

# Related Information Inner Line Permit (ILP)

- Inner Line Permit (ILP) is an official travel document issued by the Government of India to allow inward travel of an Indian citizen into a protected area for a limited period.
- It is obligatory for Indian citizens from outside those states to obtain a permit for entering into the protected state.
- Currently, it is operational in Arunachal Pradesh, Mizoram and Nagaland.
- It can be issued for travel purposes solely. Visitors are not allowed to purchase property in these regions. However, there might be a different set of rules for long-term visitors, though they are not valid for central government employees and security forces.

6. Prime Minister Narendra Modi laid the foundation stone of country's first Mobile Open Exchange (MOX) zone in Noida, Uttar Pradesh.

The Uttar Pradesh government had earlier this year signed a MoU with World Trade Center, Noida, to develop a 'tech zone' as a nucleus of the Mobile Open Exchange Zone (MOX).

7. V-46-6 and V92S2: Made in India tank engines handed over to Indian Army.



- Defence Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, handed over two fully indigenous battle tank engines, V-46-6 and V92S2, that power the T-72 Ajeya tank and the T-90 Bhishma tank, produced by the Engine Factory Avadi (EFA), a unit of Ordnance Factory Board, to the Vice Chief of Army Staff.
- The Engine Factory Avadi (EFA) has manufactured more than 12,000 engines since its inception in 1987 for the Indian Army.

- V-46-6 and V92S2 engines are based on the Russian design.
- V92S2 is high power diesel engine with 1000 HP capacity and it is fitted in T-90 Battle Tank (Bhisma Tank).
- V46-6 is also high power diesel engines with 780 HP and it is fitted in T-72 Main Battle Tank (Ajeya Tank).
- They are manufactured indigenously with 100% Made in India parts.

- 8. Government constitutes high level empowered committee to revive stressed thermal power plant.
- The Government has decided to set up a high level empowered committee headed by cabinet secretary P K Sinha and representation from the ministries of railways, finance, power, coal and banks having major exposure to the power sector to revive stressed thermal power projects.
- The Committee would look into various issues with a view to resolve them and maximise the efficiency of investment including changes required to be made in the fuel allocation policy and regulatory framework.
- It will also look into mechanisms to facilitate the sale of power, ensure timely payments, payment security mechanism, changes required in the provisioning norms/Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code (IBC), Asset

- Restructuring Company regulations and other proposals for the revival of stressed assets so as to avoid such investments becoming NPA.
- Department of Financial Services under the Ministry of Finance in its report had suggested setting up the empowered panel, besides giving operating thermal power.

# 9. Arsenic contamination in paddy is rising in Bengal

- A recent publication by researchers at the School of Environmental Studies (SOES), Jadavpur University, reveals not only rise in arsenic contamination of paddy plants from groundwater in West Bengal but also that `arsenic concentration of accumulation' depends on the variety of paddy and its stage in the crop cycle.
- Samples for the study were taken from the Deganga block in the State's North 24 Parganas district, an area that's worst affected by groundwater arsenic contamination.
- The study found that arsenic contamination in paddy was higher than in previous studies.
- The study shows that arsenic uptake in the paddy plant reduces from root to grain and that its concentration is related to the variety of the rice cultivated.
- The highest concentration was observed in the initial or vegetative state in the first 28 days. It reduced during the reproductive stage (29-56 days) and again increased in the ripening stage.
- The uptake of arsenic is faster in young roots in a vegetative state than in older tissues with a higher concentration of iron in root-soil in the reproductive phase.
